Scratches, nips and biting cannot be avoided altogether.  Appropriate first aid precautions and training in place.  Children are only allowed to handle any animal under staff supervision. 	Signs of good health: agile, clear and bright eyes, clean nose, clean ears, fur is clean and matt free, nails are a good length, feet should not be sore, teeth should be a good length, good appetite. If any of the following are noticed a vet will be consulted:	2	1	2			
	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Any sudden change in behaviour or habits (vocalising more or less, scratching, licking, etc.)</li> <li>• Any change in eating or drinking (ingesting either more or less, refusing favourite foods, etc.)</li> <li>• Any change in appearance (loss of fur, swollen areas, squinty eyes, flaky skin, etc.)</li> <li>• Any unusual discharge from the body (runny nose or eyes, odd urine, bleeding, etc.)</li> <li>• Any change in movement (limping, unwillingness to move, etc.)</li> <li>• Any change in urination or faeces</li> </ul>
